Matt's Musings

December is a time of expectations, anticipation, hope, and surprise. For Jews, Hanukkah celebrates the rededication of the Temple (with its unexpectedly long-lasting lamp) after the Maccabean victory about 160 BCE. For Christians, Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of Jesus at Christmas. For many others, the Solstice is the pivotal day, on which the sun begins its gradual climb in the sky and days begin to lengthen.

There's a lot to look forward to at UUYO this December. We'll be having a Winter Solstice celebration on Sunday, December 20, which will include a Child Dedication Ceremony. This is a Unitarian Universalist ritual in which we recognize infants and children coming into our faith. Our Christmas Eve service has been moved up to 5pm to be more family friendly, and will include a pageant, a visit by St. Nick, and other surprises.

We'll have our Gingerbread House-making party on Friday, December 18 at 6:30pm. This is a fun group activity for the children, but adults (not just parents) are welcome too. Our annual Cookie Walk, hosted by the Women's Alliance, will be Sunday December 20, at 12:15pm.

Two concerts happen this month: Jeremy Avalos, a classical guitarist from the University of Akron, will be with us Sunday December 6, at 1pm. The band Burning Sage, who performed at our Solstice service last year, will offer a concert the evening of December 20, at 6 pm.

UUYO will host the Wick Park Neighborhood Planning meeting on December 3 at 6pm at the church. If you are curious about the neighborhood or want to get involved, this is a good place to plug in. We are also participating in the Enabling Racial Reconciliation in Greater Youngstown, which will have an organizing meeting December 9 at 4pm (location still to be determined). Finally, we are working with others in the larger community to offer a Certificate of Qualification for Employment legal clinic. The CQE helps those who have a conviction that makes it difficult to find work to be more employable. Planning for this clinic begins in December.

In this busy month, be sure to set aside a little time for the care of your own spirit. I'm taking an overnight solo retreat at a hermitage in early December, just to create such a space. But even one quiet hour set aside for reading, writing or reflection could be a great gift to the self.

Dear Members and Friends of UUYO,

The year feels like it's moving so quickly! Today it is still rather warm, even though stores are filling with Christmas decorations and snow feels like it's some ways off. (Living in NE Ohio, I know that it might well not be – hard to say!)



I have been enjoying experimenting with some things at UUYO – a new style of Intro to UU/Newcomer's Circle dis-

cussion for the first time in November and will be repeated in December; trying a Sunday afternoon Explorations group; organizing a Pastoral Care meeting; and hosting a discussion on racial justice work that the congregation could participate and/or engage in are the biggest things from November.

About racial justice – part of the work that I am most interested in engaging at UUYO this coming year is anti-racism, anti-oppression, and multiculturalism work (also affectionately referred to in good UU-acronym fashion as ARAOMC). We had a brainstorming session about opportunities in the congregation and community to engage in more work in this area. I'm considering offering a course in the spring on whiteness and being white and what that means but also looking to explore some other options. I'm looking for ideas and want to know about other ideas, so please feel free to contact me! Ideas are welcome for adults and/or multigenerational activities (and Becky is curious about ideas for RE).

Other ideas suggested at the meeting include exploring options for conversations on race in the greater Youngstown community, focusing on infant mortality (as part of an initiative being developed by the Ohio Department of Health), and partnering with United Returning Citizens to offer a program for former inmates to improve their opportunities for getting a job, and possibly having a Universal Café on these topics or race and racism in the Youngstown area more broadly.

I am really excited to see the passion and the dedication of members and friends of UUYO for this work. In December, our worship theme will be "Expectation." My own life experiences have taught me that expecting particular things to happen or be can often lead to disappointment, but seeing possibilities and opportunities fills me with hope and shows me how I can be supportive of creating the changes I hope to see.

One aspect of the expectation of the season of Advent is making space inside for the holy or sacred or something-bigger-than-our-own-being. It's a time of reflection – reflecting on what we want and hope for and how we can be closer to G-d. This month I'll be thinking intentionally about those things I hope for and want for the world, as I think all of these things are tied together. The ways that we are called, the places where we find resistance, these are the things we need to listen to and hear both within ourselves and our community. This is how we will grow and change, and the practice of making space to listen is an important one to cultivate.

I am looking forward to the days ahead together – and to seeing you in church! In faith.

Winter Solstice—Dec 20



We will gather again on Wednesday, January 20, 2016 at the home of Melissa Smith to discuss *The Stuff of Thought: Language as a Window into Human Nature* by Steve Pinker. "In this exhilarating new book, Steven Pinker analyzes how our words relate to thoughts and to the world around us and reveals what this tells us about ourselves. How does a mind that evolved to think about rocks and plants and enemies think about love and physics and democracy? Why do we threaten and bribe and seduce in such elaborate, often comical ways? Share the Plate

This program designates half the loose collection at Sunday services to one specific charity per month. In an effort to ensure continuity of this worthwhile practice, the Board approved, by consensus, adoption of the following policy:

Recommendations for recipients of Share the Plate will be solicited from the congregation (forms on back table in Sanctuary), and must be submitted, in writing to the UUYO board for final approval. To ensure that the process is effective and fair in selection and distribution, the following criteria regarding the submitted organization/charity must be met:

Must be a 501(c)3 nonprofit.

Must have low administrative costs.

Must have a mission consistent with UUYO Mission. Statement.

Must have clearly defined parameters about how, and to whom, donations are distributed.

In November, the Share the Plate recipient was Sojourner House. This organization offers protective shelter to women and their children in the Mahoning Valley who are fleeing an abusive environment and who cannot safely remain in their current residence.

In December, we will share the plate with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Mahoning Valley.

BBBS matches children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported one-to-one relationships with caring adults (Bigs). These relationships change their lives for the better, forever.

At the annual meeting in January, the Board will have a by-law change for consideration. Over the last couple of years we have been adjusting to having the Board elect its own officers rather than the congregation specifically electing a treasurer, vice president, and president. Other contributions are welcome as well, such as continuing assistance with facility maintenance and participation in church activities. If you have a suggestion for new or expanded activities and would like to help make those suggestions happen, you can let Matt or me know and we'll help you get started.
