

Matt's Musings

At our annual meeting we discussed our financial situation and plans for responding to it. While our Stewardship drive finished better than last year, at about \$96,000 rather than \$93,000, it was still not enough cover the deficit we encounter. Last year our deficit was about \$16,000, and we clearly cannot sustain this pattern.

I offered to the board that I am willing to serve at 3/4 time for the rest of the year. They immediately objected, wanting to ensure that I was not taking on an unfair burden. I assured them that this was not purely about altruism, but that I was motivated for personal reasons as well as wanting to help the church. Besides improving the financial health of the congregation. I believe this temporary step will help us clarify which ministerial tasks might be done more effectively as part of a shared ministry with congregants. The most visible difference is that I will be in the pulpit somewhat less -- typically 2 or 3 times a month, rather than 3 to 4 times a month. I hope this 3/4 time proposal will raise awareness of the need for everyone to be part of our shared ministry, offering their time and talents as they are able. I do note that my personal situation is such that I can offer this proposal without hardship, and in fact feel it offers me a chance to regain a sense of spiritual balance. My hope is that this a temporary proposal and that we can reestablish both financial health and full-time ministry in the following year. I believe that a primary goal of the board and the congregation will be to work with me to make that so.

At our board retreat on Saturday, January 23, we spent our time well, developing trust as a new board, and delving into some of the challenges that we face. The board is exploring a variety of fundraising opportunities as well as a broader, more well-thought-out Stewardship program for later in the year (we are happy with the face-to-face visits, and hope to continue those). Board members will be looking for help in creating and implementing ways that will not only help us raise money but also reach out into the larger community for participation and engagement.



This program designates half the loose collection at Sunday services to one specific charity per month.

Recommendations for recipients of Share the Plate are solicited from the congregation (forms on back table in Sanctuary).

In January, the Share the Plate recipient was Angels for Animals. "Angels for Animals believes that animals, as living creatures, have value beyond economic measure." Since 1990, over 15,000 animals have been adopted through AFA.

On Saturday, February 27, UUYO will hold a clinic to help people who have returned to society from prison to improve their opportunities for employment. We will help them complete the legal paperwork for a Certificate of Qualification of Employment, which will allow them to work in many fields which they would otherwise be prohibited.

We are working with United Returning Citizens for this training. Our Share the Plate for February will help us cover costs of training those UUYO members who wish to help with the CQE Clinic, as well as promotional and other costs of running the clinic. We are grateful for your support of this important work through your Share the Plate Sunday morning donations.
