Matt's Musings

Meditation has long been a core spiritual practice for me. When I first encountered meditation over 30 years ago, it was presented as this arduous, challenging practice. You sat rigidly, and forced the mind into stillness. It took effort; I was a complete failure at stilling my wandering monkey mind. Little wonder that I abandoned the practice. While I tried meditation in various forms over the next couple decades, it just didn't "stick."

But about fifteen years ago, I finally was able to make meditation a consistent daily morning activity. I changed my perspective. I've now come to accept that the wandering mind is part of the practice. Failure is not just an option, it is welcomed. For in failure we get the gift of bringing the mind gently back to the practice, without judgment or criticism. We simply return to focus, and begin again.

Seen this way, meditation can be metaphor for life. I look over the arc of my life and see its string of failures -- school rejections, job terminations, broken relationships, financial losses, foolish actions, bad decisions. When these failures come to mind, I have too often berated myself for poor choices, weaknesses, and inadequacies.

I'm trying now to practice acceptance, reflecting that these failures are part of life. For the practice is to hold our failing, imperfect selves with kindness and affection. The practice is to remind ourselves that we would not be here, at our places on the path, had we not had all our experiences in totality, good and bad.

Such a practice of life invites an open, curious stance to life. What's next? What now? When we're able to accept, whatever may come, we are more courageous, willing to take risks, and chance failure. We become more accepting of others, in their successes or failures, seeing them without judgment, envy or blame. We begin to see more clearly the intertwined nature of the paths of all people, all beings, all acceptable, and thus glimpse the underlying unity of life.

My sabbatical has given me the gift of time to relax, read, reflect, and write; to go deeper in my own spiritual exploration. I am grateful that UUYO has been able to offer me the gift of sabbatical time.

I've avoided being engaged with church activities while on sabbatical; Kristina has handled pastoral and other concerns as Sabbatical Minister. However, I've been in touch with Kristina and I'm glad to see the UUYO community is energetic and thriving. The Auction is coming together wonderfully, and I encourage you to support it and attend, for Auction dinners and events are a great way to make and deepen friendships in the church. I also invite you to consider attending UU General Assembly, even for a day, joining some of the UUYO folks that are going, and experiencing the larger UU world. I look forward to seeing you in early June.

Share the Plate

This program designates half the loose collection at Sunday services to one specific charity per month. Recommendations for recipients of Share the Plate are solicited from the congregation (forms on back table in Sanctuary).

The Share the Plate recipient selected for June, 2016, is The Ursuline Sisters HIV/AIDS Ministry. The Sisters, inspired by faith, collaborate with community resources to empower and affirm adults and children touched by HIV/AIDS. The Ursuline Sisters HIV/AIDS Ministry provides services at three locations: the Ursuline Motherhouse and Educational Center in Canfield; Casa Madre, the children's proaram site in Youngstown: and the Comprehensive Care Center. Services include support groups, pastoral visitation to homes, hospitals and prisons, patient advocacy, and a speaker's bureau. The Guardian Angel Café is a monthly dinner/social event for the HIV community and their guests. Angela's Place is a non-food pantry of household items and personal supplies distributed to individuals and families each month, along with a food pantry from which are distributed bags of food. The Comprehensive Care Center is an adult and pediatric HIV clinic and service center providing HIV and related health care and both medical and psycho-social support services to patients regardless of ability to pay. Casa Madre is a renovated triplex where children infected or affected by HIV/ AIDS are nurtured, challenged, encouraged, mentored and enriched.

General Assembly

From June 22-26 the Unitarian Universalist Association with hold its annual convention, known as "General Assembly" in Columbus, OH. This is a chance for UUs from all over the U.S. and beyond to come together for fellowship and to learn more about our uncommon denomination.

It's been a while since I was able to attend GA, and I miss it. For six straight years my friend Jack Brizzi and I attended UU gatherings in Ft. Worth, St. Louis, Ft. Lauderdale, Minneapolis, Salt Lake City, and Charlotte. In each city we were treated to outstanding programming by the UUA.

These conventions is what began my interest in writing and as I learned more how to put into words what I experienced it became second nature to me, plus the fact that I enjoyed the atmosphere that is GA, it became a labor of love. Thanks to a former minister here I was asked to be a delegate and report back on my time at the convention. I had plenty of material to work with; the workshops, lectures, speeches, local events, plus meeting and learning from other UUs from across the country.

The focus of GA is to renew our commitment with each other each year and to focus on what our congregations around the country are doing to propel our denomination forward. There is also a business side of GA where congregations can vote on issues, resolutions are presented and when needed elect officers just like any other convention. Certain individuals are singled out for recognition and even whole congregations and districts can receive awards.

The exhibit hall is where you can find everything UU, from T-shirts to mugs, jewelry, buttons, bumper stickers and the like. You can also visit information booths to learn about service organizations, different congregations and their special projects and last but not least the Beacon Press exhibit and book sale. Beacon Press is the publishing house for the denomination. That first year I recall buying a book by Forrest Church, former minister of All Souls Unitarian in Manhattan, NYC. Mr. Church is no longer with us and the new minister there is Galen Guengerich. All Souls is one of the largest and most influential churches in the country and one of its former members was the writer Herman Melville. That book was an epiphany in my spiritual journey.

This year I can only attend the last two days of GA, June 25-26. That Sat. is the Ware Lecture and Sunday is the closing ceremony. The Ware Lecture is considered the keynote address of the convention and is always a big deal do to the star power of the speaker. Past speakers include such luminaires as Martin Luther King, Norman Lear, Karen Armstrong, Buckminster Fuller, Van Jones, Morris Dees, Mary Oliver, Elaine Pagels, Kurt Vonnegut, Rollo May, and this year Krista Tippett of NPR.

I'd like to especially recommend to our new members not familiar with GA about how enriching this five-day affair is and to urge you to attend one as soon as you can. Once you do you will discover why you were drawn to this unusual faith that values the most important principles responsible for a loving, caring people.

In June we will discuss *Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption* by Bryan Stevenson. This title is the current UUA Common Read selection. A Common Read "invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful

conversations."

The Book Group will not meet over the summer, but will gather again on September 21st to talk about Thomas Mann's *The Magic Mountain*, described as: "a great 1924 novel, long acclaimed as a masterly synthesis of the intellectual history of early 20th-century Europe and for its prescient scrutiny of elements in the German national character that had, and would again, find expression in the calamitous form of the world war."
