Bits from the Board – August 2016



Summer is generally a time for vacations, relaxation, less work, more play. But that didn't seem to be the case for the UUYO board. It's been a busy summer! The board has been hard at work planning for future events, as well as generating and leading discussions to determine the short-range and long-term goals and visions for UUYO.

The success of the UUYO Auction in June gave us renewed energy, serving as a springboard for follow-through with future event planning. Committee members of the "Books & Collectibles Sale," scheduled for October 21 & 22, have initiated plans for this event, a first of its kind for UUYO. With your help in donating as well as volunteering, it can be another successful fundraiser! Other creative ideas for events and programs are in the works for this fall and winter, including a restart of Circle Suppers, a "Fun with Opera" family event, launching a Young Adult ministry, and more! Contact any board member to volunteer, or to share ideas for additional fundraisers, events, or programs.

2017 marks an important year for UUYO – it is our 125th anniversary! We want to honor and celebrate our UUYO heritage, and plans are underway to create a committee to provide leadership for this celebration. In anticipation of this important event, we also want to make UUYO more visually appealing. Short-term improvements, including grounds upkeep, building repairs, painting, etc., will be carried out in the next few months, with more extensive improvements under discussion. For example, UUYO is in the final stages of acquiring ownership of the parking lot across the street.

Matt came back from his sabbatical in mid-June, refreshed, and energized. With his guidance, there have been lengthy discussions regarding the goals and visions for UUYO – in 2017 and beyond, followed by recommendations of actions needed to get us there. We discussed our strengths, our shortcomings, and addressed specific issues needing attention in the near future, such as membership, stewardship, communication practices. But regardless of issues and hurdles that we often face, history has shown that the strength of our UUYO community is real. I am proud of what we as a church community have accomplished, and I hope you feel that same pride. We will survive another 125 years and beyond!

Matt's Musings

Unitarian Universalism is unique among religions because we tolerate an unusually wide variety of beliefs and ideas. Among us are Christians and atheists, Buddhists, Muslims and pagans, 'none-of-the-above's, and more. We are "the faith of the wide path." But without a common set of beliefs, what keeps us together? We have been able to stay unified as a faith movement because we cherish the value of relationship, which we express with the word 'covenant'.

Now covenant may seem to be one of those stuffy Old Testament sounding words, and I've wondered if maybe some other word might work better. Maybe contract? But contracts are specific, legally binding, with penalties for breach of contract. Contracts are about law, not love. Maybe a better word might be agreement? But an agreement generally implies that we agree on viewpoints, understandings and beliefs. Covenant allows for that special case where we "agree to disagree," and we disagree while remaining in a relationship of love and mutual respect.

So we stay with the word covenant as our theme of the month of September, where we explore the question, "what does it mean to be a community of covenant?" We'll explore the kinds of promises we make each other, how we hold one another accountable, how we stay in relationship, with love, even when we fail, and have to begin again.

Many UU churches include the reading of a covenant as part of their worship services. Such covenants are often similar to this version written by Unitarian minister Rev. James V. Blake in 1894:

***Love is the Spirit of this church and service is its prayer
This is our great covenant. To dwell together in peace
To seek the truth in love and
To help one another.***

I believe UUYO may have used such a covenant in the distant past -- some of you recalled reading such a covenant on Sunday mornings. I hope part of our work in exploring our history would be to recover the covenant we used, and see if it might be a helpful touchstone as we live -- covenantally -- into our shared future. For learning to live in covenant is increasingly important.

REflections

Welcome back to my UUYORE families! Many of you have taken the summer off, so I am looking forward to seeing you all again! Sometimes it's hard to get back into the swing of things, but I know for me, it always feels like a homecoming when I see my UUYO family again in the fall! Official Religious Education classes will resume on September 11.

We are doing some exciting things this year. After attending General Assembly this summer, and after news story after news story that continue to open my eyes to how embedded racism is in the structure of our society, I feel called to do something. I feel disheartened when I think about the depth of the problem, and how hard it is going to be able to change. But I have hope for the future, and the future is in the hands of our children and youth. The change I can help affect is to get our youth to be thinking about these things, and to lead the way. This year, the Intermediate and High School classes will merge on Sunday mornings to do a curriculum called "Be the Change!" to work toward racial understanding and justice.

We will continue to offer Children's Chapel the first Sunday of the month, where we will explore the monthly theme as a whole group. The exception to this will be the youth who will be involved in the Coming of Age program, who will meet separately during Children's Chapel. This will be the second Coming of Age program during my tenure as Director of Religious Education, and it will look a little different than last time, meeting once a month with a few weekend workshops. This program provides a chance for our youth to firmly establish themselves in Unitarian Universalism, and decide what it means to them.

I am excited to welcome a few new teachers to the UUYORE family: Chesney Gulas, Michaella Moore, and Kerry Planty will be joining the rest of the team consisting of Alicia Baker, Scott Baker, Liz Hill, Alison Locketti, Hope Moran, and Mark Vance. These are the people who make the Religious Education program a success, and I am so grateful to have them on the team!

A date to put on the calendar: October 3, 2016 at 3:00. That's when UUYO will be participating in the annual Non-Violence Parade. All are encouraged to attend!

Food will be available for purchase (a pizza, hot dog, coffee and soft drink type of menu) along with Equal Exchange coffee items and donated baked goods. Sales will be on a cash and carry basis.

A special **Private Preview Sale** will be held on Friday evening, October 21, for members and friends of the Church only, from 7 pm to 9 pm.

Donate Items for the Book and Collectible Sale

Please save items to donate for the Book and Collectible Sale scheduled for October 22 at UUYO. Items needed for the Book Sale include hardcover and paperback books, collectible magazines, CD's, audio books, and DVD's (no VHS tapes, no cassette tapes, no encyclopedias). "Collectibles" include items of value that people collect, art, jewelry, and antiques. Donated collectible items should be of a size that could fit on a table top. This is not a rummage sale so we are not accepting clothing, shoes, hats, coats, baskets, appliances, TV's, computers, or furniture. Donated items must be in working order and not be damaged. We may also be in need of paper bags, plastic bags, and newspaper to wrap collectible items after purchase. In addition, we'll need donated baked goods to sell at the event.

As we approach the event we will be accepting donations. Items can be delivered to the Church after the church service on October 16th, and on Wednesday evening, October 19th from 6 pm to 8 pm, Thursday evening, October 20th from 6 pm to 8 pm, and on Friday afternoon, October 21st from 1 pm to 5 pm. For individuals who are absolutely unable to deliver larger quantities of items to the church, we may be able to arrange for a truck to visit your home on a specific date and time for pick up.

Spiritual Explorations Wednesday, September 21, 7-9pm

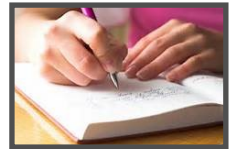

Circle Suppers are Returning to UUYO!

Saturday, September 24

What is it? Circle Suppers are pot-luck dinners for 6 to 10 held in someone's home. The composition of the group varies each time, and no two dinner parties have the same guest lists. People eat, drink, enjoy themselves, and converse on all sorts of random topics.

What's the purpose? To provide a way for people to get to know each other in a relaxed, informal small group environment—to build a sense of community. Topics of discussion could include art, books, quantum physics, politics, even religion.

What if I can't come on the selected date? We plan to do Circle Suppers again, every few months.

What does the host do? The host coordinates the dinner party, arranging who will bring what contribution of food or supplies to the pot-luck supper. Guests are typically assigned some dish such as dessert, bread, appetizers, salad, soup, beverage, etc. Generally the host provides the entrée unless someone else offers to make it. The host sets the time for people to gather and provides directions to the home. When the host calls the guest to discuss about what dish to bring, they can discuss possible parking or access difficulties. The host may select a theme.

What does the guest do? Bring themselves and a dish. Also before signing up, check your calendar to make sure you can plan to attend. If, after signing up, it turns out that you can't attend, you must let the host know as soon as your plans change. Last minute changes sometimes cannot be avoided, but they create difficulties for the host who has planned the meal and needs each person's pot-luck contribution.

How do I indicate my interest? You will find a form in the order of service and newsletter. Return this to the envelope on the bulletin board in Channing Hall at least a week before the scheduled date. You can also fill out the form online at <http://bit.ly/UUYOCircleSupperSignup>

What happens after I sign up? All the names are organized as the coordinator matches people for dinner parties. The coordinator notifies hosts and provides a list of guests. The hosts then have to contact each guest with directions and to organize the dinner.

Is there a catch? Not really. Sign up by the due date. Host if you can. Bring food. Enjoy dinner, talk, and expand your circle of church friends.

Bring a Friend to Church - Sunday, Sep 18

On Sunday, September 18, we invite you to bring a friend to our service.

We Unitarian Universalists are generally uncomfortable with proselytizing. We dislike it when others come knocking at our door, and we get annoyed when we find flyers tucked under our windshield wipers. We don't want to be coerced about religion.

But for most of us, this congregation and the religious values it stands for are dear to us. The UUYO community is an important part of our life. We do want others to know about this wonderful place, but how do we talk about it without sounding like we're either proselytizing or desperate or just plain weird?

We might change the tone of what we're trying to say. We might say, for example to a friend, something like this:

"As you probably know, the UU church in Youngstown is very important to me. It is a place where I feel at home. Since you are someone who is also important to me, I want to invite you to see the place and meet other people who I also value. On September 18, our minister will speak on the topic of breadth of belief, and we'll have beverages and light snacks after the service. Would you accept an invitation to visit on Sunday, September 18?"

The important distinction I want to make is that we are not trying to convert anyone to Unitarian Universalism, we are simply asking people to experience something that is important to us. (Of course, it would be lovely if some folks do decide check us out more thoroughly, maybe even joining us, or telling their friends about us, but that is a side effect, not our primary goal.) We are simply asking people in a straightforward way, without any pleading or coercing. They have the right and opportunity to say 'no' without any consequences or diminishing our relationship.

I hope that through Bring a Friend to Church Sunday, we can all grow in the challenge of talking about religion with friends, and make genuine dialog and invitation a part of how we interact with others.

Circle Suppers (continued)

What about kids? Some circles are multigenerational, just indicate you'll bring kids.

But I'm a vegetarian! (Or have other dietary restrictions) There is a spot for this on the form so the host will be notified. In addition, the person with a special dietary need can bring a dish (or two) that s/he can eat, and ample for the number of guests attending.

But I can't cook! Can I still attend? No problem. Many places offer an assortment of fine take-out selections of salads, appetizers, entrees, side-dishes, bread, and desserts. Or maybe the host can assign you the beverages.

But I have no place for people to sit! My house isn't fancy enough for a dinner party! The elegance of the home and its furnishings pale beside the spirit of community that characterize these gatherings.

What's the theme? No theme is required but it can be fun to go with something to tie the food together such as Cinco de Mayo, Italian, or Southwest. Other theme ideas include: bringing a dish based on the recipe of a celebrity cook, bringing a meaningful quote, coming in the guise of your fantasy self, etc.
