Bits from the Board

The March 2017 Board Meeting started with stunned silence when we were given the news that Matt plans to pursue his calling as an Interim Minister and will be leaving UUYO effective July 16, 2017. We were joined at the meeting by Rev. Renee Ruchotzke from Kent who serves as our primary contact with UUA Regional Staff and will assist this congregation as we plan how to move forward; she gave us an overview of the options that are available to the church and the board will be addressing these in the next few weeks and months. I want to let you know, though, how we reacted.

The shock we felt at Matt's unexpected announcement was mixed

- With feelings of pride in the way our congregation is becoming a more active and relevant location for people who find the current political and social environment challenging to their core beliefs.
- With feelings of sadness at losing the talents and companionship of Matt and Liz who are so instrumental in what we have achieved as a congregation.

- With feelings of goodwill and hope that Matt and Liz find the best place for them to be in the future; with some feelings of insecurity and questions about what happens next for UUYO.
- With feelings of challenge as we face the future with many options to consider and decisions to make.
- With feelings of optimism as we recognize that we have a group of members and friends at UUYO with amazing skills, strengths, and dedication who can work together to make a plan to move forward.
- With feelings of excitement as we recognize that we are a congregation and a community with potential!
- With determination that, now more than ever, we must continue to be the Beacon of Progressive Thinking in the Mahoning Valley.

### Matts Musings

By now, most of you know that I have announced my departure from the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Youngstown. My last day will be Sunday, July 16.

We have time now to reflect on the years we've been together, to remember the good times -- and the bad times too -- and to ponder the changes ahead. We will have time to grieve, for this is a loss for all of us. For me that grieving hit me when I was helping put mailing labels on the letters that went out announcing my departure -- I pictured the

people on each label, and thought about the time we've had together, and how I'll miss you.

I will be happy to meet with any of you -- member, friend, or newly with us, returning -- in these coming months, to answer concerns or just to talk. Additionally, I will schedule group gatherings for conversation -- the first of these is a Conversation on Saying Goodbye, Wednesday evening, April 26.

My decision to depart has been a long time coming and was not an easy decision. There were many discussions between Liz and me, and other discussions with colleagues and mentors as I tried to sort out my feelings in light of the arc of my ministry with you. I first arrived as a contract minister, a green, unseasoned character, new to the parish life. With your input, I focused on specific transitional goals - welcoming, growth, social justice, and we began an amazing time together. A few years in, we decided together that you should call me as your settled minister, so that I could stay for an indefinite time in this ministry.

Over time I realized that the ministry I enjoyed most was the work I did near the beginning of my time with you. I loved the focus of that early ministry. Such focus is the essence of Interim or Developmental Ministry, a specific kind of ministry within our faith tradition. Such ministers serve churches for a brief period -- a year or two typically -- in between longer settlements. They work with churches on specific goals, helping them address any bad habits or unhealthy behaviors that may exist, and helping them imagine a new and more expansive future for themselves. Interim and Developmental Ministers facilitate the inbetween space between past and future ministry. They increase the likelihood that the church will do well with the next settled minister.

This is the kind of consulting ministry work I feel called to do at this point in my life. It's an uncertain path, for as an Interim or Developmental minister, you don't know where you might end up in a year or two. I don't yet even know where we will be next year -- the process where churches and Interim ministers chose each other opens up during April. It's risky business -- but a calculated risk, one that I hope opens up new opportunities for growth and service to our movement.

I know that dealing with a ministerial transition seems like an unwanted, unexpected burden, and I am sorry for this. Yet I have great confidence that UUYO will emerge from this transition stronger and more vibrant, with a clearer sense of who you are and where you are going. This church is in a great position to attract the right minister, who can help lead you to be more clearly the beacon of progressive thought and spirituality in the valley.
