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December Worship Theme: "Presence"

The spiritual idea of presence can mean two radically different things. One the one hand, contemplatives talk of "being present." Presence from this perspective is all about awareness and remembering to "live in the moment." On the other hand, theologians tend to come at presence from the perspective of "otherness." Their concern is not just that we pay attention to the present moment, but that we notice a transcendent Presence that is woven through all moments. Which of these two ideas fits for you? Maybe both? During December, we'll explore what presence in our church community means to us.

Matt's Musings

It is three weeks after the election. Our congregation seems somehow changed. Unitarian Universalism seems somehow changed. Yet we have not changed, instead, we now live in a changed world. Those changes have made us clearer about who we are, what we're doing, what we value. This clarity is apparent to me as I've talked to many of you in recent weeks, and as I talk with colleagues in our UU movement.

As Unitarian Universalists, we have always had strong religious values, strands of which trace back to and are woven into those high-minded founding values of this nation. We celebrate and protect those values, even as we remind ourselves that some of the nation's other founding values, around slavery and racism, for example, are immoral, even evil. Our values have caused us to work tirelessly over the years against oppression and evil in its many forms. We've worked for abolition of slavery, women's suffrage, rights of Native Americans, peace, resisting Nazi violence, civil rights, justice reform, the environmental movement, immigration reform, marriage equality, and the Black Lives Movement.

We are, more than ever, a beacon for progressive religion in the valley. We are a light of hope and prophetic promise for all who dream about a better world. This broad bright beam of our expansive religious faith shines a way for everyone who finds our values speak to them - among them:

- Every person counts as we defend the inherent worth and dignity of all people.
- The world counts as we defend the earth and the web of life we share.
- That democracy counts as we defend the right of conscience and the democratic process.
- That reason counts as we defend the free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

But we are also a religious community, coming together on matters of spirit, faith, and trust. We, and our children,

come together because we realize that spiritual growth is best accomplished in the presence and companionship of others.

In times like these, it is even more critical to fortify this beacon of progressive religion and let its light shine. Among the many ways we do this, a most critical one, is through our regular contributions of money to support the work of the church. This is our stewardship season, in which everyone who cares about the church is encouraged to make a pledge -- a promise of regular financial gifts for the next year. We realize that not everyone can make such a pledge, but if everyone who can give will give, and give generously, we will be stronger, more able to support each other, and better able to live our values in the coming years.

As a beacon, our church is like a lighthouse that provides guidance to ships on stormy seas. We are those ships. Author and poet Clarissa Pinkola Estes writes:

"I grew up on the Great Lakes and recognize a seaworthy vessel when I see one. Regarding awakened souls, there have never been more able vessels in the waters than there are right now across the world. And they are fully provisioned and able to signal one another as never before in the history of humankind....

One of the most calming and powerful actions you can do to intervene in a stormy world is to stand up and show your soul. ... To display the lantern of soul in shadowy times like these - to be fierce and to show mercy toward others; both are acts of immense bravery and greatest necessity....

When a great ship is in harbor and moored, it is safe, there can be no doubt. But that is not what great ships are built for."

Equal Exchange for the Holidays

It is the time of year for visiting and parties, so it is time to stock up on Fair Trade items from Equal Exchange! In this crazy consumer world, and at this crazy time when the people who are already struggling are targeted for even more punishment or exploitation, we can do a few good things in return.

Equal Exchange is a remarkable cooperative which deals <u>fairly</u> with small farmers, mostly in equatorial latitudes, who produce the products that we in the northern climates love: coffee, tea, and chocolate. The big, industrial conglomerates fight to obtain these commodities at the lowest prices possible. And many Americans fall prey to

the desire for cheap goods. Cheap is no bargain if it means that small farmers in faraway lands are squeezed by big, faceless buyers. The fair trade concepts grew out of a commitment to treat growers fairly, offering prices and financial assistance so that such small farmers could work their lands, grow crops, and make a living to support themselves and their families in a decent fashion.

UUYO has been participating in Equal Exchange for over 12 years! We serve fair trade coffee at our events, and we market products for your own use, or for gifts (!). So, this season it is time to stock up on gift packages. Your purchases work wonders in many ways: the products are excellent quality, the church gets a small amount from each sale, a contribution goes to the social service work of our denominational organization UUSC, and small farmers around the globe earn a decent living. You can do all of the above by visiting the Equal Exchange coffee cart on Sunday mornings. See you soon!

Share the Plate

We will share our loose plate offering with the Richard Brown United Methodist Church's Food Pantry in December. This is the same organization that received the bounty we collected during the November 20 service. They call their food pantry "the Food Shelf" and service 60 to 70 families per month. They usually pack 72 orders for distribution. The distribution is on the last Wednesday of each month. They try to keep the distribution in the neighborhood. They don't turn anybody away but they try to direct people who visit from other parts of town to services closer to their own neighborhoods.
