While we missed the presence of Ralph Malmer in Florida and Sarah Lowry and Linda Mohn at women's marches in DC and Pittsburgh, we had a very productive meeting that consisted of Matt Alspaugh, Anita Wesler, Molly Toth, Louisa Berger, Tom Beck, and myself, Andy Crabb. We spent part of the time getting to know each other and then reviewed our goals and budget for 2017.

We noted that our members have helped up a long way toward our stewardship goal for the year, but that we still have a gap between our planned income and planned expenses. A big goal for the year is to have Matt at full time instead of part time for the year and we feel that is realistic as we reported at the congregational meeting. We will need to increase our pledge and giving income for the year, so if you are willing and able to make a new pledge or increase your pledge for 2017, it will be a tremendous help in keeping things moving forward for the year. There will be opportunities to work on income through Fun!raising activities too, so there are many ways to contribute to the vigor of UUYO throughout the year.

With 2017 being the 125th anniversary of UUYO's origin, we are working on plans that include exciting events and capital improvements at UUYO that include replacing the steeple with a cupola or smaller steeple, revamping the outdoor courtyard, and doing various repair and cleanup tasks around the building to make it clear to the community that we are a vibrant and present group of folks that welcomes people interested in our outlook and approach to life and living.

Look for opportunities to join in the action as we welcome broad participation from all who are interested.

Matt's Musings

This month, for vacation, Liz and I are studying Spanish in an immersion program in Mérida, in the Yucatán, Mexico. I have long wanted to master another language, in part to see if I could; Liz likes to know something of the local language where we travel. This week I am reminded of more fundamental reasons to learn another language: In a time when forces of fear and hate are working to build walls between cultures, learning a language is one small

step toward tearing down walls of division. Further, in my struggles to learn Spanish, which is considered an easy language to learn, I think of refugees who come to the USA. Most struggle to learn English, considered one of the harder languages to learn -- and they often are doing this in less than ideal settings, with volunteer teachers in their spare time after work. I am humbled by the enormity of the task of learning English, just one among all the challenges these immigrants face.

In my Spanish immersion class, a common question asks what we do for a living. I explain that I am a 'pastor' (I learn that the word for minister, 'ministro', means a government official), and of course the next question is -- 'for what church'. After some effort, we determine that the Spanish name for the UU faith would be Universalista Unitario. But what's that? With help, I explain that we are a 'libro' or free faith, and we include Christianos, certainly, but also Budistas, and Paganos, and Humanistas and Agnosticos and Atheos. With that last word - atheists - I observe raised eyebrows 'really?'. Now I note that our story is a good bit more complex than this, with our passion for social justice, and our varied historical roots, that for example, our longest running churches are in Transylvania (that also gets an eyebrow raise).

How do we explain our faith to others? Especially when communicating is a challenge for whatever reason. Maybe the time is short (hence 'elevator speech' -- an explanation you could give on an elevator ride). Maybe language is a barrier, as it was with me this week. What would you say? What are the few essential things that make you passionate about Unitarian Universalism? These are good questions to ponder, to have answers handy, for there are many who are looking for what we have to offer. But they will not learn about us unless we are able to tell them. I encourage you to be ready to talk about our faith with your friends and others around you who might find our church a place of sanctuary and strength in the world as it it today. We've got something valuable here, let's share.

So much going on!!! All good!!!

If you weren't there for the Annual Meeting, then you may not know that as of that day, we started a new High School RE class! We have a critical mass for making a classroom work, and so we are. A huge thank-you to Gina Vance and Samantha Fitschen, who have agreed to lead that class. They are doing the same curriculum that the Middle School group is doing, which is a free curriculum from the Tapestry of Faith curricula put out by the UUA. It is called Be the Change!, and it is a curriculum that address race and racism. I am so happy to be able to offer this additional class!

At the Annual Meeting, I also referred to my not-yet-workedout plan for our Social Action Sunday. It is now worked out. This was supposed to have taken place the 5th Sunday in January, but because of scheduling issues, we switched our February Children's Chapel, which was supposed to be the first Sunday in February, to the last Sunday in January, so we could do our Social Action on February 5. On this day, we will have a panel of speakers, consisting of adults and youth, who will come from the Islamic Society of Greater Youngstown. They will speak to us about their religion, but also about what it is like to be a Muslim in Youngstown, Ohio. There are many stories out there about hate crimes against Muslims, and we would like to know if that is true here. Making connections and making friends is the first step in combatting hatred, and if nothing else, we will have made connections and made friends! I am very grateful to that community for agreeing to come speak to us.

We have also had a request to resurrect the Parenting Group, which is a group that we had several years ago, where we would have a potluck dinner and talk-sometimes on subjects, sometimes not. Our own youth had provided the childcare that evening. We will have a planning meeting of sorts on Friday, February 24 at 6:00, which will essentially be a Parenting Group meeting! Please let me know if you

are interested in attending so we can plan space accordingly.

Not bad for a fairly short month!

Equal Exchange

The opportunity to buy excellent food and beverage products that are fairly traded should be a "no brainer" for us. Our congregation's participation in the Interfaith Program of the Equal Exchange worker-owned cooperative is a long and steady one. We started buying fair

trade coffee in 2003. That's almost 14 years of support to small farmers around the world!

UUYO started using Equal Exchange products in our church kitchen and selling a few coffees and teas to members. We are now pleased to be one of more than 650 UU congregations and organizations supporting small farmer co-operatives by handling fairly traded products through Equal Exchange. Over time, we expanded the inventory to stock additional Equal Exchange coffees, teas, cocoas, snack items, and the ever-favorite chocolate bars.

With the proceeds of this project we stock the coffee, tea, sugar, and paper cups in our church kitchen. Every time you enjoy a warm beverage during Sunday morning's Coffee Hour, or at a UUYO event, remember that you can support that "cuppa" by your purchase of those products for your use at home. Equal Exchange also contributes a portion of our sales to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. In 2015 that amounted nationwide to more than \$12,000 toward the UUSC work for social justice. We donate the remainder of our proceeds to the church operating budget as an ongoing fund-raiser.

Come and see us at the Coffee Cart on Sunday mornings. Try new coffee or cocoa, help the church, and most of all, join in the partnership to support small-scale farmers.
