"Hope"

Hope is one of those concepts I've wrestled with for years. It seems so basic to being human, and to our understanding of the human spirit, and yet it is a challenging concept. There are times I thought it best to be without hope rather than put my hope in things that could inevitably lead to disappointment. Throughout my time in seminary, it was a theme that I continuously wrestled with, trying to see if I could find a hope that had integrity. Little did I know that immediately after graduating seminary, our country, our culture would be forced to undergo this kind of soul searching as a nation. This present generation is overwhelmed with hard truths, truths that are difficult to digest, and it can be tempting to think that hope was only meaningful in simpler times, naive times. It is easy to think of ourselves or others as being naive or ignorant for being hopeful. "Hopeful for what?" we may ask. This sense is especially true immediately following disappointment.

And I think this is the important question we now face - What are we hoping for? It's a question that seems to demand a specific answer, and yet I think the wisest thing to do may be to leave it unanswered, and live into it.

A definition of hope that I've come up with is **- a feeling of joyous expectation for the unknown.** I find it too limiting to pin my hope on this or that, to place all my hope on one bet, and hope it pays off. In the short term we may put our hope into this or that, but I think it is important to reserve part of our hope, and leave it unspecified. It is a hope that is a general feeling of joyous expectation for something good without fully knowing or understanding what that good may be.

It's a hope that is free of expectation for specifics. We are living in times when it is clear that any of our lives can change in an instant - we truly don't know what may happen tomorrow. Living into this with a feeling of joyous expectation is quite a feat, but it can be done.

That is what this season reminds us every year. It is no accident that our most prominent and festive holidays take place in winter during the darkest, bleakest time of year. We use color and food and fellowship to cultivate the capacity for this joyous expectation, though we may see little external evidence for this outside our windows. Outside we may experience cold, barrenness, stillness. This season of hope reminds us of our capacity for joyous expectation in times when life seems to be put on hold.

Winter is my favorite season. It's the season I was born in. I find the starkness beautiful. I find the stillness pregnant with possibility. It's a time when I feel more in touch with my spirit. This is a season that reminds me what really matters, and it

helps me to appreciate simple warmth - the warmth of friends, a warm bed, a warm church. It reminds me that there is no way I can stay warm and thrive on my own - that I am dependent. And this makes me happy. I feel a bit more humility, and I feel more human.

It's a paradox that by engaging the cold and the difficult, it can make us happy. It's not a happiness based on a particular outcome, but rather stems from the confidence that we can experience joy, even when we aren't easily able to come up with a reasonable source for that joy. It's unspecified joy. It just exists, and so do we. And experiencing this natural bond literally enlightens us - it brings a flame to the cold corners of our living, and it encourages us to bring this light into our meeting with others. And for what reason does this light thrive? I'm not sure - and this is the mystery and beauty of hope.

But the opposite may also come true - it is easy to lose hope. It's reasonable and expected that disappointment will knock on our door, and it knocks loudest this time of year.

In the Christian tradition, they refer to this time as Advent, as a waiting period for hope to arrive into the world. Real hope is always Advent - it's always found in the place of waiting. So if you're feeling like you're waiting for hope to arrive - you're in the right place, in the right time. It's on its way.

Sunday, December 3: "The Audacity of Hope"

This is the famous title of Barack Obama's book which informed his successful presidential race..

Obama's initial inspiration for the book was a sermon he heard by Rev. Jeremiah Wright who offered a thorough and impassioned interpretation of the painting done by G.F. Watts called "Hope" - a harp player clothed in rags, with only one string left to play - hence the audacity to hope.

Come Sunday, to hear the sound of this audacity.

The generosity of all who have pledged is greatly appreciated. Our hope is that we will be able to reach our goal of \$140,000 by the first week of December. This will enable us to move forward with a strategic plan for 2018 that will support our short-term goals and pave the way for long-term objectives. With the help of all in our church community, we can make 2018 a year to be remembered!
