### Letter from Rev. Joseph Boyd

It is my great pleasure and honor to have the opportunity to serve you as your minister. Matt Alspaugh and I have had numerous conversations, and I am heartened by his ministry with you the last 8 years. He speaks of you with great love and affection, and has encouraged me to enjoy my time with you, as he certainly has.

I hope you have had a chance to get some kind of introduction of me from the board of directors. I don't believe you can tell much about a person through hearsay, but it's a start. I'm coming to you most recently from All Souls Church, Tulsa, OK as their intern minister. One of the members of the search committee told me to wear a cowboy hat when I arrive. It always makes me laugh the assumptions we make about people and places.

I come to Youngstown with a few assumptions about UUYO...just a few. I'm impressed by the level of participation you have of lay members in various church activities, including fundraising. It seems you

have built a culture where members understand shared ministry, and take ownership of the church as theirs. The church does not solely belong to me as your minister. It belongs to us. I'm glad this is understood. I'm excited to work with the worship associates who bring passion and talent into creating a worship service that has the power to transform us. Worship is a great love of mine, and I'm looking forward to collaborating and learning with you. My introduction to the city of Youngstown was through the members of the search committee who spoke plainly about the difficulties that the city continues to face, and how UUYO has made a commitment to be in relationship with these difficulties in order to transform lives and the city as a whole. I respect this very much, and was one of the reasons I was drawn to your congregation.

Our country as a whole needs communities like UUYO. If we are the thrive as a real people, I believe we must be connected to communities that spiritually nourish and guide us as we navigate our shared future. This is a time in history when church has an opportunity to truly matter again, and not just exist as a Sunday pastime or mausoleum. Our cities need ministry, and they need it expressed in a way that can be understood and felt.

I'm continually reminded of the symbolism of the chalice: the bottom half representing community (from the communion cup), and the flame in the middle representing individual freedom. We are a faith that allows for each individual to discover their unique light with the support of community. Nobody has a light that is self sustaining. We need each other to continually light and relight the flames that make us most fully human. We need one another.

I have never visited Youngstown and I haven't yet stepped foot in UUYO...but I can't wait to. I sense your collective passion and vitality, and I can't wait to join you. I'll be coming to you with my wife Jennifer and our two cats: Simon and Jasper. I can't honestly say the cats are thrilled (they hate moving), but both Jennifer and I are looking forward to seeing Youngstown through your eyes, your hearts. I can't wait to meet in person. We are quite excited to be coming into a different culture, and I am looking forward to a different kind of ministry.

As is part of our practice in professional UU ministry, please know that I will refrain from contact with members and friends of UUYO for a year after I depart. We follow this practice to make plain the shift in ministry and to give the new minister space to form their own ministry. If I do encounter folks from UUYO -- at General Assembly, in travels, or otherwise -- I'll certainly be happy to see you, but won't encourage you to tell me how things are going at UUYO. I will also share those encounters with your new minister. June is a good month to be in touch with me for one more conversation, one final chance to reflect on UUYO, to hear about my plans, or just a chance to say goodbye. To become a member of the Church, an individual must sign the Membership Book in the presence of the minister and/or an active member of the Church. We define the rights and responsibilities of membership as ~

Regular attendance at worship.

Voting at congregational meetings.

Making financial contributions.

Contributing time and talent.

Pursuing your own spiritual growth and development.
