"Intention"

It's more accurate to say this month's theme is "in tension." We are in constant tension between the past and the future, between hope and reality, between our expectations and the actual unfolding of our days. In this chasm, in this tension, we find the real meaning of intention. Intention is always "in tension" with where we've come from and where we hope to go.

When I was training as an actor I learned a valuable lesson about playing with intentions. I was instructed to find what I thought was the intention of a given scene I was playing, and work hard with that intention - daydreaming, exploring, using my imagination. Then I was instructed before I was about to step foot on stage for that scene, to let go. I was instructed to let go of my intention, and trust that all the work I had done in preparation would somehow show up in my present moment - often in surprising ways. It required of me a level of trust I was unaccustomed to. It required me to trust that as much as I was working on an intention, that intention was also working on me in ways I vaguely knew.



Many of us feel pulled in many directions. We feel the pressure and responsibility of family life, our work life, play, and our

Annual Meeting

The 2018 Annual Meeting of the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Youngstown will take place after church on Sunday, January 14, 2018, in Channing Hall.

As it has done in the past few years, the Board of Trustees will provide a light lunch for everyone following the church service.

All are welcome at the annual meeting and anyone can be involved in discussions; only Active Members, however, may cast a vote on issues brought up during the meeting. Absentee ballots are permitted. The pertinent sections of the UUYO by-laws are below:

Article V. Voting Rights.

Section 1. The right to vote at meetings of the congregation shall be restricted to active members after sixty days of active membership. Each member shall cast one vote on each matter which shall come before the meeting.

Section 2. Active members unable to attend a meeting may cast absentee ballots. Absentee ballots must be presented in writing to the President prior to the beginning of the meeting. The ballot must state the member's position clearly enough to be interpreted at the time of the vote. Absentee ballots count toward establishing the quorum for a meeting.

future goals. It can be tempting to think - "If only I could lessen some of these tensions, I could really blossom, and become who I was meant to be." Perhaps this is true in certain instances, but I'm more intrigued and challenged by the alternative. *What if all the things that pull us in different directions, that give tension to our life, are actually the birthplace of real intention?*

Our intentions perhaps are not hindered by the pressures and tensions of our daily living, but rather these tensions are the rich soil we can depend on to enrich our journey, helping add depth and texture to our being. I think this is especially true in the time we are living in.

The tensions politically, economically, and socially of this given moment are helping us collectively give birth to our most noble intentions. I see this happening daily. I see it happening individually with congregants I speak to, and see this happening in the collective life of our church. We are growing - not just in number. The tensions of our time are encouraging us all to become more intentional about what church means, and what purpose a spiritual life has in alleviating suffering for ourselves and others. The big questions are back on the table, and there is a light shining on them. The source of this light paradoxically is the political and social turmoil that surrounds us. These realities are in tension with who many of us desire to be.

This January offers a special opportunity for us all. Instead of feeling that the tensions in both our personal and national lives are detracting from our deepest heartfelt intentions...we can see that they are working together. Tension has the capacity to open our heart. Tension has the capacity to wake us up from a complacent slumber, and remind us what really matters. Tension can keep us accountable to our deepest desires for ourselves and for our world. Tension is not the enemy of our intention.

Reflections

Happy New Year!

There is something about beginning a new year, looking ahead at a year of possibilities. It is a time of reflection, too, to examine where we are and where we might want to be. We often set New Year's Resolutions... and know we are going to break them. Why do we do this to ourselves? One theory is that our "shadow" selves, the unpleasant parts of ourselves that we usually try to ignore, sabotage our efforts. Our laziness keeps us from going to the gym, our gluttony keeps us from losing weight, our rage keeps us from being nice to people all the time. But what if, instead of just "resolving" to change, we set actual intentions for this change, including your intended plan to act toward that change?



Maybe it's not change that is even needed. We live such busy, distracted lives, that maybe our intention should be that we live more intentionally. Be intentional about what you choose to do with your time. Figure out what is important to you, and make sure to spend time doing that (...like coming to church, perhaps?!) You can set personal intentions, as well as intentions for the family. We will be working on setting some intentions at church.

The first step of setting intentions is reflecting on the current state of things. I have been doing this for the RE program. The Coming of Age program is going well, and the facilitators of that class are very intentional about what they are teaching, when, and how. The next group of classes have felt a little less intentional this year. We had combined the elementary and intermediate classes, at least for opening worship, with the hopes of separating them afterward. But because there have not been so many kids in the combined class, they have stayed together. This has not been meeting the needs of our intermediate (middle school) class. So, we have divided the classes again completely. We will be looking into curricula that are more theologically-based, either one that deals primarily with Christianity or one that deals with world religions. This is to meet the needs of the youth in that class who have requested that kind of programming. The teaching team will be meeting to discuss the choices to make an intentional, well-thought-out decision on this.

So, I wonder... what are your intentions for this year? You might know what they say about where the road of good intentions leads..., so also reflect on actions you might take to help you meet those intentions. This is the critical part. So... what will you do this year?

From Women's Alliance— Giving Thanks

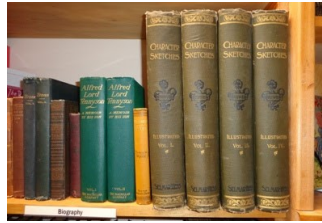

The **UUYO Book Group** will meet on Wednesday, January 17, 2018 at 7:15 pm at the home of Melissa Smith to discuss *Unto the Sons* by Gay Talese. A *New York Times* Notable Book, this title



describes how the family came from a small town in Italy to New Jersey and it “reads like a good novel... as Talese meticulously reconstructs his family chronicle, a larger dramatic portrait of an entire region and way of life emerges.”

The February title is *Twelve Years: An American Boyhood in East Germany* by Joel Agee, the son of James Agee. Joel was raised in East Germany. This title was described by Christopher Isherwood as: “one of those rare personal memoirs that brings life to a whole country and an epoch.”

UUYO Book Group II

Last year some members of the UUYO book group, inspired by Ellen Satre’s brother George, a Joyce aficionado, undertook the reading of James Joyce’s *Ulysses*. George suggested reading the work in smaller segments so the group met six times between February 1 and December 6, 2017 to discuss the assigned chapters of the novel.

The *Ulysses* group started with nine or ten interested readers but only five attended all six meetings. *Ulysses* is a title on almost everyone’s “bucket” list and the five who persisted with this title are glad they stayed the course. All expressed the opinion that they would probably get more out of the book if they reread it; all agreed that rereading *Ulysses* right now is not going to be a group effort.

Instead, we decided to read some Shakespeare in 2018. The first title we will read is the tragedy *Coriolanus*, based on the life of the legendary Roman leader Caius Marcius Coriolanus. We will meet to discuss *Coriolanus* on Wednesday, January 24, 2018 at Melissa’s and would welcome anyone interested in joining the group.

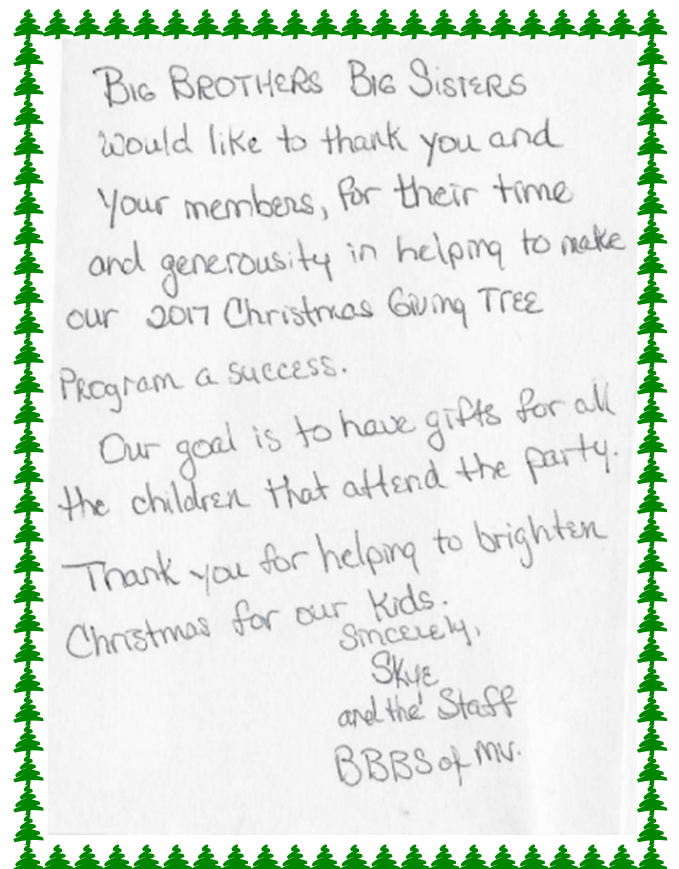

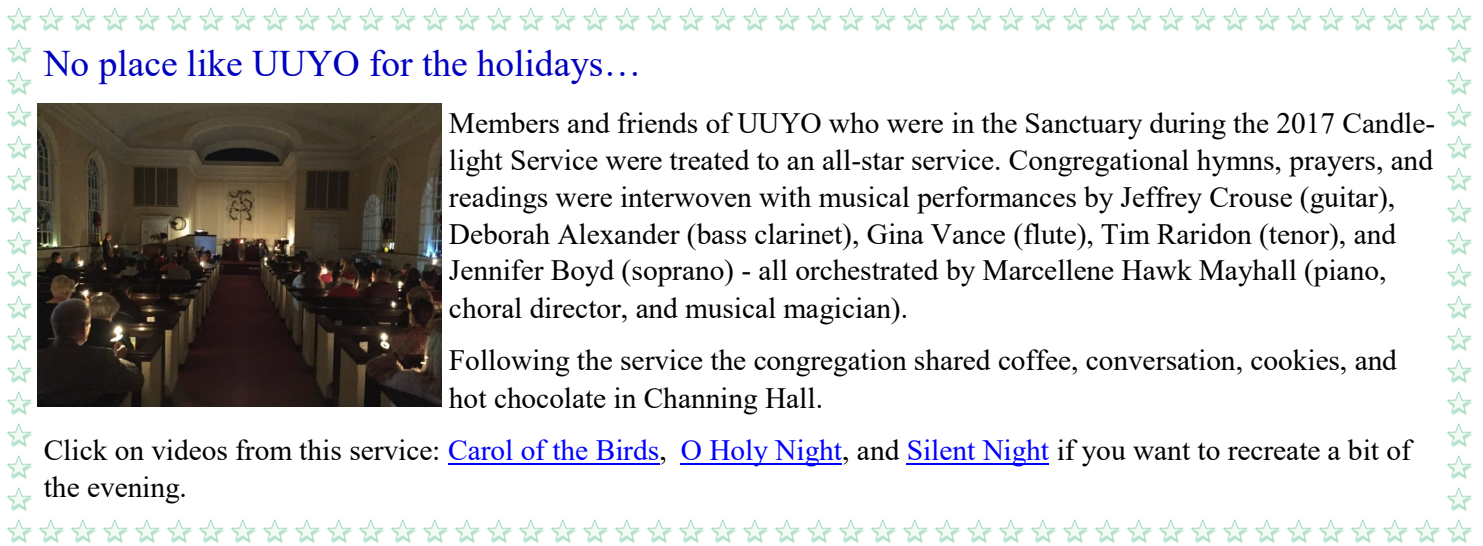

How are you doing this holiday season?

It's all right—you can be honest.

Are you feeling exhausted? Worn down or overwhelmed by the tragedies across our country and world? Frustrated by stories of corruption and greed on the daily news? Are you holding heartbreak, anger, even fear? It's okay not to feel cheerful. This has been an especially difficult year for so many.

One of the things that gives me hope and strength when fear and despair move into my heart is all of you and this faith that we share. The practice of religious community calls me back to my humanity, to a practice of compassion, and to the power and importance of the values of love and justice, equity and interdependence.

It is in religious community that I find a place to bring my heartbreak, and to bring my fear— and in that collective sharing my strength and my spirit are renewed. Did I Hear That Right?

You've heard the phrase that you should never **assume** because "it **makes an ass** out of you and me," right? This is in introduction to some details about one of the entertaining but somewhat puzzling carols sung at the UUYO Candlelight Service on December 24th. The hymn, "Orientis Partibus," seemed to have something to do with hay and donkeys, but it was not in either hymnal...

It turns out that this song is attributed to Pierre de Corbeil, the 13th century Bishop of Sens (that is in France) who created the Donkey's Festival that celebrated the flight of the Holy Family into Egypt and during the mass at this festival, it was common for a donkey to be led or ridden into the church.
