#### "Welcome"



The word welcome has taken on a much more radical and concrete understanding in our current political climate. Many congregations have made their church sanctuaries for immigrants under the threat of deportation. Becoming welcoming in this specific way is seen as a risky proposition legally and otherwise. Under the best of circumstances, being welcoming consistently to people and ideas that seem foreign to us is a challenge...but today it can seem downright impossible.

Our past collectively as a country and our trigger points as individuals are being pushed daily. It can feel exhausting, overwhelming, even cruel. I think there is an important difference between welcoming and approving. As people of conscience we definitely don't approve of prejudice or mistreatment, but we are being challenged to welcome that experience as part of reality. Welcoming is not the same thing as liking or supporting what is present. But if we don't work our welcome muscle, we will not know how to fruitfully engage the realities that are presenting themselves. When we fail to welcome, we can oscillate between disbelief and overwhelm. To welcome a situation is to accept on the deepest level that this is reality, and is part of our lives. Becoming welcoming allows us to have some choice about how we perceive and engage reality...it's a gateway to curiosity.

Part of the pain for many of us is we believe that we know what is going on. We believe we know what is happening or not happening, and often we wish it was different. Becoming welcoming of reality, whatever it may be, can help but make us curious about its true nature and origin. A welcoming attitude gives us the resilience we need to stay with a situation longer than we normally would, to perhaps get a glimpse of something that surprises or contradicts our assumptions. Without a welcoming spirit, we are controlled by our reactions, which are quick and often shallow judgements.

The most concrete way to practice welcome, is to practice welcome with ourselves. We can begin by welcoming our experience of a given situation. If we are not aware of our own experience, it is impossible to be welcoming of somebody else's. We can suggest to ourselves an attitude of welcome, and see what comes into our head when we encounter situations, particularly situations that distress us. We don't need to force ourselves to be or think differently...over time practicing a welcoming attitude with whatever comes up will begin to shape us organically often without us even realizing it.

It is very difficult to welcome pain and fear when it impacts us or our loved ones. It is perfectly understandable why we'd want to distance ourselves or try to find some way to make it go away. And yet sometimes it just doesn't go away...it persists. When pain and fear persist we have 4 choices - denial, panic, stoicism, or welcome.

It has been my daily practice these last 6 months to cultivate a welcoming attitude, so that I can better be of service, rather than add to the chaos. A welcoming attitude is fundamentally seeing another as part of ourself. This what it means to be a welcoming congregation is the most expansive sense. We celebrate individual difference, and understand at our most welcoming that those differences are fundamentally connected to who we are in the core of our humanity.

I realize at the tail end of writing this newsletter, that this may sound like a weighty interpretation of "welcome." It is not my intention to paint being welcoming as a daunting task, but rather as an expansive one. We have no idea the power of offering an authentic welcome. To illustrate this, I'll close with this famous Universalist story: John Murray was an itinerant preacher in England who experienced great misfortune - his wife and small child died of disease, he went bankrupt and was put in prison for inability to pay his bills. He gave up his religion due to great despair. Friends told him to start a new career and life in America, so he set sail for New York, where he heard there were many jobs. There was a powerful storm that took his ship off course, and left him shipwrecked off the coast of New Jersey. A man named Thomas Potter helped him onto shore. Potter asked him Murray what he did for a living, and Murray shared he was a preacher, but decided to give that up. Potter asked him what he preached, and Murray replied he shared the good news of a God who loved everyone without exception, and where all would be saved. Potter told Murray he built a church with his own hands, and he was waiting to find a preacher like him. He told Murray: "You, John, are that minister. Welcome. I have waited for you a long time." That welcome led to the founding of Universalism in America.

Come Sunday, to welcome who we were.

#### Reflections



Welcome back, everyone! I hope everyone has had a wonderful summer break, and I want to welcome everyone back to another church year.

Welcoming is what we do allow others into our lives. There are many things associated with welcoming- warmth, kindness, openness- to name a few. We talk about welcoming strangers into our

circles, about opening our hearts and minds to others, opening our hearts and minds to change.

This month, we will be exploring the theme of Welcoming. To be welcoming is to follow the Golden Rule- we do not want to be shut out, so let us not shut others out as well. We are living our faith by honoring the inherent worth and dignity of others by welcoming them into our hearts, lives, and discussions.

We will be exploring this topic in the first Children's Chapel of the 2017-2018 church year, which will be on September 10. Children and youth ages 5 and up are welcome to attend this Children's Chapel, which will be held in the Patio Room this year. Children ages 5 and under are welcome to attend the Nursery.

Our Religious Education classes will continue to explore our monthly themes using curricula built around the theme of the month. In this way, families can share in their church experiences and have a similar topic to discuss on the way home after church and throughout the week ahead.

This year, we are going to have another Coming of Age class for youth who are in 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grades and their equivalents. I am very excited for this program this year, as we have 6 or 7 youth eligible for this program, and a team of facilitators (Gina Vance and Samantha Fitschen) who are ready to go with overnights and programming. I don't want to brag (ok, I will!) but the schedule is already planned for the year! Their classes will be every other week, once during Children's Chapel (but not in September) and then the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of the month. The other weeks, they will have several options to get them involved in the church- from helping in other classes, to attending service and helping in various ways throughout the church.

For the first time ever, all teachers this year are returning from last year! We welcome them all back. Class structures will change a little. Our preschool-aged children are really young, and will remain in the Nursery. Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade will be together in a class. The rest of the children, grades 2-7, will begin together in the large RE room. They will do Opening Worship together and then will divide up to participate in activities around the theme. I will be working with the high school youth to tailor a program that works for them, likely following a Small Group Ministry format along with attending services.

As parents are the primary religious educators in their children's lives, I want to try and end newsletter articles with a question to explore with yourselves and your children. See below.

## Call for a UUYO Congregational Meeting for September 3rd

As first announced during the Service on August 20th, the Board of Trustees of UUYO is calling for a Congregational Meeting to be held on Sunday, September 3rd, immediately following the Church Service in Channing Hall to ask the membership to vote on authorizing the Ordination of Joseph Boyd by our Congregation. Please see the newsletter article following this one for information regarding the ordination procedure and details about the event. There will be time for discussion at the meeting prior to the vote. The Board is suggesting that we host the Ordination Ceremony at UUYO on Sunday afternoon, October 29th, as part of our continuing celebration of the 125th Anniversary of the founding of our Church.

# September 3rd UUYO Congregational Meeting: proposed Ordination of Joseph Boyd

Becoming an ordained minister in the Unitarian Universalist tradition and meeting UUA standards is a process that takes a considerable amount of time and commitment. A potential minister must have a Master of Divinity Degree from an approved theological school. Additional special courses, internships and special projects approved by the UUA lasting two years or more, programs to develop ministerial leadership skills, passing committee reviews, and demonstrated motivation for ministry, are some of the many requirements.

Our UU Congregations in the United States operate as independent organizations within the Unitarian Universalist Association. This means that a new minister is ordained through the authority of a local congregation, not the UUA. The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Youngstown has a unique opportunity to ordain Joseph Boyd in 2017. Joseph has completed all the requirements suggested by the UUA. Although Joseph's previous Congregation offered to ordain him, he waited until he was assigned as a full time minister to UUYO with the hope that our Congregation would conduct the Ordination Ceremony.

The Ordination Ceremony is an important moment in the continuing development of our

Church. This opportunity to ordain Joseph Boyd coincides with the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of the founding of UUYO. The UUYO Board of Trustees wants to incorporate the Ordination Ceremony as a part of the ongoing celebration of our 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.

The Board of Trustees will appoint a Committee to plan and coordinate the ordination. Our UUA District Representative will assist. It is customary to invite other UU ministers and area UU officials and congregants, along with local ministers from other denominations, and dignitaries, to the ceremony. The UUA makes available guidelines and suggestions for ceremonial content, including ritual, music and ordination text. Individuals of importance in the life of the minister to be ordained are invited to attend. A reception usually follows the ceremony.

The Board of Trustees of UUYO called for a Congregational Meeting to be held on Sunday, September 3<sup>rd</sup>, immediately following the Church Service in Channing Hall, to ask the membership to vote on authorizing the Ordination of Joseph Boyd by our Congregation. The Board is suggesting that we host the Ordination Ceremony at UUYO on a Sunday afternoon in late October (possibly October 29<sup>th</sup>). Of course, the Committee working in consultation with the Board will make the final plans and share that information with the members and friends of UUYO as soon as possible.

In order to accomplish the goals outlined above, the Board of Trustees will seek approval from the Congregation to proceed. The following motion will be introduced during the Congregational Meeting:

"Moved that the Congregation of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Youngstown empower the Board of Trustees to proceed with the Ordination of Joseph Boyd at a date and time to be determined by the Board, and appoint a Committee to coordinate the Ordination Ceremony with duties to be determined by the Board."

During the Congregational Meeting the Board will certify that a voting quorum exists in the Hall. The President of the Board will offer a few brief opening remarks regarding the purpose for the meeting and then call for the motion to be introduced. A discussion will follow along with a vote.

Voting members of UUYO should attend this important and historic Congregational Meeting.

## **Budget Update**

Early in August, actively donating members and friends of UUYO received an appeal from the Board of Trustees for additional contributions to the 2017 pledge drive to help avert a possible \$20,000 budget shortfall by the end of this fiscal year.

Initial contributions in response to our letter have reached nearly \$4,700.00 and there are two fundraising initiatives described elsewhere in this newsletter that have the potential to further reduce the shortfall.

There are, however, members and friends who have not yet responded – we urge you to consider the energy and activity you see at UUYO in anticipation of the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the potential ordination of our new minister; this is an exciting time and UUYO welcomes your additional support.

#### Share the Plate

Our Share the Plate collection, half of the loose plate offerings in September, will go to St. John's Episcopal Church to support them in hosting historian Carol Anderson, author of *White Rage: The Unspoken Truth of Our Racial Divide*, for an evening event on Thursday, November 2. Beginning at the Civil War and moving forward to our tumultuous present, the recent images of Charlottesville still very fresh in our minds, Carol Anderson chronicles our continuing conversation about race, examining the often hidden but influential forces opposed to black progress in America. *White Rage* has received the National Book Critics Circle Award; *New York Times* Notable Book of the Year; *Washington Post* Notable Nonfiction Book of the Year; *Boston Globe* Best Book of 2016; and *Chicago Review of Books* Best Nonfiction Book of 2016.

In order to ensure that this important conversation is free to the public, St. John's is partnering with other churches and community organizations to cover costs associated with organizing the event. UUYO's contribution will help to ensure that residents of the Mahoning Valley are able to attend and participate in a dialogue about the difficult truths of racism in America.
