Mystery

It is wonderful and dreadful that we are compelled to know what we cannot know. It is wonderful because we are continuously moved to see beyond our limitations, to push ourselves to the point of transcendence. It is dreadful because we are bound to time, place, and biology simultaneously. Dread is the root of awe. The great fear and apprehension that accompanies us in a quest of understanding is related to the wonder that we even have the capacity to make the attempt at understanding in the first place. Fear and apprehension are prime indicators that we are about to approach our limits, and enter mystery.

Fear causes us to tread with care, and this is wise. Often we are trained to think of faith as a leap in the dark, but I am a proponent of treading carefully with a candle in hand to light each cautious and trembling step. There is wisdom to entering our living carefully, with care and sensitivity. Mystery is not an esoteric or exoticized experience, but the very instance of our living given adequate attention. Adequate attention is a relative term, but I think it is something that is easily forgotten in the rush and stress of most of our lives.

This month's theme demands adequate attention for it to mean anything at all. Mystery as a term is more often

a barrier, a stopping point. It is easy to shrug off just about everything as being a mystery, and go on with our usual way of thinking and doing. A working definition of mystery is: I don't know fully how this is possible.

It is distressing when things feel difficult and impossible. But too often the possibility itself is taken for granted. Instead of musing on the impossible possibility of our being alive in the first place, we can't help but wonder where we're headed, and what will be in store for us.

This month we will breathe life into these questions: Who am I? Where did I come from? Where am I going? These questions are alive now, and have been since the beginning of humanity. They compel us to answer, to say something for ourselves, though we know in our heart of hearts that our answers will always be proximate, never finished or complete.

Each Christmas Eve we light candles in the dark while we sing "Silent Night" in unison. It is a beautiful thing to behold. A reminder of calm and brightness, and yes, love.

May you feel the warmth of this community in this season. May you let this community hold you steady when shaky. May you let UUYO guide you deeper into mystery.

It feels like it is time to reimagine what the RE program should be and how to best meet the needs of our families and the church. We will be forming an RE Committee for the first time in a long time to help reimagine the program and to help implement the new ideas that we have. I look forward to seeing what we can come up with!

An update from the Stewardship Team

As of yesterday, our At the Heart of Transformation pledge drive has raised just over \$106,000 in pledges for 2019. This is great news, and we thank everyone who has stepped up to make a pledge of financial support to UUYO so that our life-saving ministry, programming and dynamic presence on the North Side of Youngstown can continue into the next year.

However, we are still \$34,000 shy of our goal of \$140,000.

And \$140,000 is where the goal will stay. It is, quite simply, what it takes to do what we do.

There are a few outstanding pledges remaining--folks we expect to hear from, so that will help somewhat. But it is not likely to get us all the way to the goal.

So what's \$34,000? It's about \$340/apiece over the course of a year, or just under \$1 a day. Quite within our reach as a congregation.

After service last week, Sarah Lown approached me and pitched a brilliant idea: a Pledgling Fledgling idea. Sarah said that she will match a new member making a first-time pledge of \$10/mo (\$120/year).

This is an amazing and generous idea. And we decided to run with it. Do we have any takers? Anyone willing to step up as a first-time pledger? Anyone willing to step up as a matcher?
