Unitarian Universalism has a long history of leaders bravely stepping up and speaking out on controversial social justice issues because of our beliefs. Two examples of courageous UUs were Rev. James Reeb and Viola Liuzzo, who marched in Selma, Alabama for Civil Rights. Both of their young lives ended abruptly and violently in March of 1965 because of their activism and shared commitment to living our UU principles.

This Sunday, we will explore the lives of these UU martyrs and reflect on what it means that they died in the struggle against racism and hate while fighting for hope and love.

Unitarian Martyrs

Many may be surprised to learn our monthly worship theme is "Unitarian Martyrs." In a faith that has a reputation in the United States among the general public as an ambivalent, questioning, open-ended religion, it may not be assumed that we have martyrs who have shaped the character and charted the depth of our tradition, but that is truly the case.

Given my religious upbringing as a Jehovah's Witness, I can't help but reflect on the question - What kind of faith would I be willing to give my life for? The Jehovah's Witnesses were one of the groups that were targeted by the Nazis during World War II, and were put in concentration camps. My father told me this history, and emphasized that by simply signing a paper which would renounce association with the Jehovah's Witnesses, one could avoid the concentration camps and probable death. I remember my father asking me with complete seriousness - "But what would become of you, if you renounce your faith?"

The paradox is that though I still think highly of those who maintain their faith and tradition under the threat of death, I did eventually renounce my faith and affiliation as a Jehovah's Witness. As I became a member of a Unitarian Universalist congregation, I carried the same question though - What kind of faith

would I be willing to give my life for? I sensed that whatever faith I would be willing to give my life for, would be the same faith I could give my life to.

The Unitarian martyrs, unlike other faith traditions, are not mythical or legendary. They are actual human beings who made brave and unconventional choices under extreme circumstances. The martyrs whose stories we will learn from throughout July are: Viola Liuzzo and James Reeb, Francis David, Norbert Čapek, and Michael Servetus.

Without giving you any spoilers, I will tell you that some prominent themes emerge among these martyrs even though their lives and deaths span centuries and disparate geographies and cultures. Those themes are justice, peace, and freedom of thought/conscience. These themes chart clearly for us the parts of our faith that remain pillars.

Last month I was invited to speak at Dorothy Day House, a Catholic-led institution, to share with them the reasons why Unitarian Universalists are so eager and ready to engage in social justice issues. My hope is that through the study of our martyrs, our faith ancestors, we will gain for ourselves more clarity and appreciation for the reasons ministers and lay people have risked their lives on behalf of others.

Another thing I hope to instill is that freedom is never an end unto itself. We offer an unusual level of freedom in terms of discovering theology and belief in general. But this surface freedom is only the beginning phase of our faith development if we have the yearning and curiosity to grow. Using our freedom to choose a path that has dignity and includes more than ourselves, is the mark of a mature Unitarian Universalism.

As our public institutions and culture remain in a period of shock and flux, it is important we see the markers of a mature faith amongst various individuals, so that we may discern for ourselves the path we are called to take. Our martyrs are there to help us today – not just to show us what is worth dying for, but help us find what is worth living for.
