Belonging



As I was considering becoming a contract minister at UUYO, I was told that pledge drives would be one of the hardest times of year for any new minister in this community. In the past I heard there had been significant shortfalls, and

this awareness was not widely shared or understood by the members. I was told that I would be ministering in an economically challenging environment, where talking about money may be viewed as threatening or shameful.

I am glad to say in my tenure as your minister, none of this has proven to be true. In my first year as your contract minister, in partnership with the Board of Trustees and the chairs of the pledge drive, we committed ourselves to transparency. This meant that we would be open with you about our financial needs as well as our financial promise. During that first year pledge drive when I became your minister, you have shown your commitment by raising your pledges by over 25% from the following year, an incredible show of support. After two years we are able to maintain our programming, including offering much deserved raises to our staff, and grow our ministry, especially in the realm of social justice. We are currently about to hire a part-time sexton to help maintain the beauty and security of our wonderful building. More than this, we are practicing true kindness through transparency, and allowing ourselves to be proactive about our future.

I look forward to our pledge drives. I can honestly say it is one of my favorite times of year, because I get to see clearly the commitment you make to this church and this wider community. It is a time when we come to understand a sense of belonging.

Belonging is our worship theme this month. A pledge we make through time and money is a clear expression of this belonging. Many newcomers who walk into our sanctuary on a Sunday morning may be unfamiliar with what pledging is, and how it works. Many may not know that we rely 100% on the financial support of our members to continue our mission and programming.

Some of you may have noticed that we have moved from giving 50% of our offertory plate to a worthy nonprofit organization to giving 100% of all cash donations during Sunday worship. There is good reason for this both theologically and practically. Theologically we are living into a reality of abundance. We are practicing generosity rather than scarcity, and we are finding joy in giving ourselves completely to our wider community. Practically we are putting more trust in you as members and friends to sustain our mission through pledging. We trust the generosity and intention of all of you, so that we can be generous with both our time and resources with a community that needs us. I firmly believe that it is important to be on a path of belonging. This path includes our church, our family and friends, our country, and our growing understanding of belonging in an interdependent world in crisis.

This month we will have an opportunity to practice belonging in a very down to earth and practical way. Our pledge drive will begin October 13th, and based upon request, aim to be done in three short weeks. This abbreviated pledge drive means that we will need your pledges to be turned in by the deadline of Sunday, October 27th, so we have time to plan next year's budget with the finance committee. Your generous pledges have supported the mission of this church and good work in our community for 127 years. I'm looking forward to this practical act of belonging with all of you during our 2020 pledge drive..

October Bits from the Board

This month's theme of **Belonging** is one that resonates with me because I am a pretty shy person. From elementary school through the first few years of my professional career I never felt comfortable in groups where I didn't know people well and since I was too shy to make the first move, I hardly ever got to know

people. I didn't feel like I belonged. That had not changed when Martin and I signed the book in 1977.

I was raised, as my husband says, by the village atheist; next door to a Universalist Church with which he was usually at odds over territorial, rather than theological issues. I had no youthful religion against which to rebel and so I couldn't appreciate the opportunities that UUYO offered.

We brought the kids to church, Martin participated in a variety of activities and became the B&G guru, while I preferred to lay low and read the newspaper on Sunday mornings; being a church lady was not in my comfort zone. I have "belonged" to the church for over 50 years; I have actually paid attention to the church for about six of those years.

When I retired and got involved with the Women's Alliance, I began to pay more attention. Then I was persuaded to be a Board Member and paid more attention, but it wasn't until I agreed to undertake the position of Treasurer that I really began my journey to belonging. I began to spend time in the office and had to interact with lots of people I knew only on a very superficial level. The more I delved into the mysteries of how UUYO operates the more I got drawn in to the community, I became more comfortable with people I had known on a very superficial level for years, I began listening with a different attitude and began understanding what this church means to its members and its community. When I thought about the October theme, I suddenly realized that I really do belong to UUYO.

I've seen how this congregation has developed a real presence in the community and is making a difference. I love how much social justice work is being done here and how we are interacting with churches, synagogues, mosques, and other groups to make a positive impact in a world where people are not important to those in power. I don't just belong to UUYO; I am proud and happy to admit it. Who ever thought that would come from the writings of Louisa Lipari Berger?

While I was thinking about Belonging I had a conversation with a member of the Richard Brown Congregation who is active in the neighborhood and who has volunteered to bring others from the

Methodist community to help us celebrate Thanksgiving this year – their congregation has merged with several others in the area and they no longer have a church on the northside. I suspect they feel they belong here; I hope so.

During our conversation I learned that, at Richard Brown, the Thanksgiving celebration took the form of a free Thanksgiving meal offered to the community during the week before Thanksgiving. What if we did something different this year? With the assistance of the experienced folks from Richard Brown we could have our thanksgiving dinner a little earlier than usual – and share it with our neighbors. We would need to streamline the menu and disrupt a tradition, but we might be creating a different tradition that connects UUYO to the community in a different way than before and emphasizes the way we want to belong to our wider community.

The folks from Richard Brown would help, but I would like to see us have a group of people really get into it from UUYO. If the thought of this speaks to your soul, let me know – I'd love to get to know you better if I don't already and this would be a fine chance for us all to know each other better as we help others.

Give Away the Plate

This program donates the undesignated collection at Sunday services to one specific charity per month. UUYO's Give Away the Plate recipient for October 2019 is the Bus Station Project.

Since last October an amazing group of volunteers have helped migrant men released from Core Civic in Youngstown Ohio. Once released, the men are dropped off at the bus station to begin their journey to meet their sponsors. They are oftentimes released with nothing but the clothes on their backs & their release papers. Most do not speak English. The volunteers help them get their tickets and give them backpacks full of supplies for their trips. Backpacks include snacks, water, toiletries & a change of clothes, hats, gloves and coats are provided in the winter. On occasion, they are unable to get a same day ticket & arrangements need to be made for overnight accommodations. There have also been instances where tickets need to be purchased. This project is funded 100% with donations.

Northside Farmers' Market

Northside Farmers' Market will end summer season at UUYO in September due to limited amount of available stuff. There will be a market **October 5 from 2:00 - 6:00** as part of the Fall Corn Roast at 906 Elm. Lake to River Food Coop Grocery inside Cultivate Cafe will continue, and offers double up program for EBT/Snap/food stamp card holders.

Game Night Fun!




UUYO's first Friday Night Games event attracted nine Scrabble, Scattergories,

the Unitarian Church of Hinsdale in Illinois.



Book Group 1



On Wednesday, October 16, the UUYO Book Group will meet at the home of Melissa Smith at 7:15 pm to discuss *Word by Word: The Secret Life of Dictionaries* by Kory Stamper.

"While most of us might take dictionaries for granted, the process of writing them is in fact as lively and dynamic as language itself. With

sharp wit and irreverence, Kory Stamper cracks open the complex, obsessive world of lexicography--from the agonizing decisions about what and how to define, to the knotty questions of usage in an ever-changing language. She explains why small words are the most difficult to define (have you ever tried to define "is"?), how it can take nine months to define a single word, and how our biases about language and pronunciation can have tremendous social influence. Throughout, Stamper brings to life the hallowed halls (and highly idiosyncratic cubicles) of Merriam-Webster, a world inhabited by quirky, erudite individuals who quietly shape the way we communicate. A sure delight for all lovers of words, Word by Word might also quietly improve readers' grasp and use of the English language."

November's title for this group is *Midnight's Children* by Salman Rushdie.

Book Group 2

This group will not meet until November 20, 2019, but anyone wishing to participate in the discussion about Henrik Ibsen's *Peer Gynt* is welcome to start reading this five-act allegorical drama in verse. Ibsen's play tells the story of the downfall and subsequent redemption of a Norwegian peasant anti-hero. While the work was not originally intended as a performance piece it has become one of the most frequently presented Norwegian plays.

It is highly likely that this meeting will be accompanied at some point by <u>Edvard Grieg</u>'s *Peer Gynt, Op. 23*; this work was composed, at the request of Ibsen, to accompany the first performance of the play in 1875.
