Possibility

The beginning of possibility is not knowing. As we enter the new year, the year 2019, it is common to decide upon resolutions and try mightily to fulfill them. This presupposes a certain level of control over our lives. It presupposes that our living can be dictated solely by our intentions and effort. It is a persistent illusion. The illusion of the "self-made man," a person who by sheer willpower is able to construct a life for themselves, is a persistent and seductive illusion.

Effort is indeed a requirement for a meaningful life. So is intention. But many of us are seduced into thinking that these two elements are all that it takes to create a life of meaning. We can easily forget that the motivating forces in our life and in most lives are unforeseen possibilities. It is understandable that we would downplay this persistent truth. The unforeseen is scary for reasons that are self evident...we cannot control, manage or fully anticipate that which we have never seen. The unforeseen provokes anxiety, fear, and wonderings that can easily turn dark and unpredictable. Many of us are conditioned to assume the worst when we have no or little information to go on. Taken to an extreme, the unforeseen can make us feel like a complete victim of circumstance. It can shatter us.

It is a leap to imagine that unforeseen circumstances that lie in wait for us could be unforeseen possibilities. This leap requires a level of optimism that is difficult to maintain, especially since the unforeseen may include things we don't like.

In this new year, I think the most important mindset to cultivate is: don't get ahead of ourselves. I mean this in the literal sense. Stay with yourself: with your body, mind, and breath. It is tempting to project our living into a neat and tidy picture of ourselves as we are now, but improved in the future. We may envision ourselves thinner, richer, with less worry, more joy. We may envision our present as merely preparation for a brighter future. But by staying with our experience now, we fulfill our future dreams. We embody a brightness that will not fail us as we embark upon the new year.

Each step we take is already a complete fulfillment of our resolutions. Even if that step seems to take us off track or away from our intentions.

The essence of possibility is not knowing. We know only one thing for sure: the unforeseen will happen. Can we live into this reality in 2019, with dignity and heart? At UUYO, I think we can. We have what it takes to see the unforeseen in its truest form: possibility.

Annual Meeting Sunday, January 13 (SA) 12:15-1:15pm

The 2018 Annual Meeting of the First Unitarian Universalist Church of Youngstown will take place after church on Sunday, January 13, 2019, in Channing Hall.

As it has done in the past few years, the Board of Trustees will provide a light lunch for everyone following the church service. All are welcome at the annual meeting and anyone can be involved in discussions; only Active Members, however, may cast a vote on issues brought up during the meeting. Absentee ballots are permitted. The pertinent sections of the UUYO bylaws are below:

Article V. Voting Rights.

Section 1. The right to vote at meetings of the congregation shall be restricted to active members after sixty days of active membership. Each member shall cast one vote on each matter which shall come before the meeting.

Section 2. Active members unable to attend a meeting may cast absentee ballots. Absentee ballots must be presented in writing to the President prior to the beginning of the meeting. The ballot must state the member's position clearly enough to be interpreted at the time of the vote. Absentee ballots count toward establishing the quorum for a meeting.

All are welcome to attend UUYO's meditation group on January 13 and 27 from 4 to 5pm. If it is your first time attending this group, please come 15 minutes early (3:45 pm) for some basic instruction.

The group will meet in the Youth Room at UUYO on the second and fourth Sunday of the month. Teachings will be presented in the Tibetan Buddhist tradition. We will be using the book *The Heart of the Buddha's Teaching* by Thich Nhat Hanh. Each meeting, the group will read a section of the book, have a short discussion, and then sit together in silent meditation. There is no fee for these meditation sessions - just bring a peaceful spirit, and an open mind.
