Stories of Youngstown

I never planned on joining a church. I certainly never planned on going to seminary, and becoming a minister of a church. This wondrous journey began for me with a question, and an unexpected response.

I was introduced to a Unitarian Universalist minister, and I had never met this person before, and I had never heard of the faith he belonged to. Like many who first hear the phrase "Unitarian Universalism," I was convinced that it was some kind of new age group, a cult, or both. I asked this minister a simple question: "What do you believe?" His response planted a seed which would bloom and guide the next decade of my life. This minister responded: "It's not as important to know what I believe, but rather I try to help my congregation discern what they truly believe."

I imagine if you took a random sample of people in Youngstown, and asked them the broad question: "What do you believe?," you'd gather a variety or responses. I imagine these responses to include a belief in God, a belief in family, a belief in a strong work ethic, a belief in nothing, a belief that the world is going to hell in a handbasket, a belief that kindness matters. There are an endless variety of beliefs swirling around in even one single individual. We hold contradictory beliefs about ourselves and the world every waking moment. These beliefs become actualized and triggered by the world we surround ourselves with: our friends and neighbors, family, the news, stories we've learned, stories we're still trying to find a way to tell. I have continued to remain fascinated with the question of "what they truly believe." Embedded in this question is the assumption that what one says they believe may differ from what one truly believes. There exists a gap between surface belief that can be recited, and the lived experience of belief that is proven true in one's living.

I am far more interested with the latter. I am not as interested in what one says they believe, as I am in recognizing what one truly believes by how they live their daily life. Our life is the true proof of our belief system, whether we know it or not. The goal of our church community is to make this a conscious process, to teach ourselves and others that we have a choice about beliefs that will guide our lives. This choice demonstrates in no uncertain terms that each one of us contains the opportunity to be the authors of our life, to tell a story of beliefs worth living for.

We are surrounded by myriad stories, and we can't get enough of them. We ingest movies, tv, books, news reports more rapidly than we ingest solid food. This is because stories are important for sustaining ourselves, more important than even solid food. We live and die based on the stories we tell ourselves.

This month's worship theme is "Stories of Youngstown." We will have a chance to explore what we truly believe as a community about who we are, where we've been, and where we might go. We will have a chance to find out what we truly believe. We will have a chance to make a choice about which stories we need to tell, and which stories we want to live by.

Bits from the Board

New Committees

Two new committees have been formed which are <u>in</u> <u>search of members.</u> One is The Safer Congregation Committee, with Judy DeGenova as the Chair, and the other is The By-Laws Revision Committee, with Diana Shaheen as the Chair. For all of you congregants who want a safer environment for our UUYO Community and who are interested in how the church operates, now is your chance to get involved—we need you!

Accessibility and Transparency

Also, thanks to the hard work of Louisa Berger, the activities of the Board are becoming more accessible. The Board's minutes are not only in hard copy in a notebook in the office, they are also online on the UUYO Website: under the drop down tab "About" scroll down to "Governance" and click under "Minutes" and you will find UUYO Board Minutes through the May 2, 2019 meeting. Additionally, (for those who don't know) the board meetings are open to the congregation. Unless noted otherwise, the board meetings are on the first Thursday after the first Sunday of the month. Upcoming Board meetings are always posted in the monthly newsletter and are also on the website under the church calendar. https://uuyo.org/news/upcoming-events/calendar/.

It was agreed at our June meeting we would utilize the democratic process of a secret ballot (paper ballot) for the congregation to decide whether to confirm Reverend Boyd's settled ministry.

The Board approved Reverend Boyd's hiring a part-time sexton and agreed he would be hired as an independent contractor and paid hourly.

Mystery Wallis will be the Interim Religious Education director.

Building Facility

- We are still working on constructing the sanctuary railing, and have an alternative solution in place. We hope to have the railing up as soon as possible.
- Tom is working on better wheelchair accommodations for the sanctuary, and is discussing his ideas with the architectural consultant who was at the church, Saturday, June 8^{th.}
- Louisa said she will look into a better battery charger for the hearing aid devices that are used during the service.
- Tom updated us on the lights in the Cupola—an ellipsoidal reflector was purchased to make the lighting stronger and more defined.

Policy Issues

The Board discussed opt-out versus opt-in for pictures of children and adults for publication on social media or other UUYO news outlets. Some preferred the opt-out option with a large sign posted which states the individuals need to request to opt out of having their or their children's picture taken. This would mean there is a lot less paperwork involved. Others feel it is preferable to have an opt-in policy in which everyone who attends the service must state they want or don't pictures taken, It was brought up that if a picture is taken and a custody battle is in process, the picture on the Facebook page might be an issue. Finally, we agreed to give the issue over to the Safer Congregation Committee to discuss.

The Give-Away-the-Plate is an issue that was discussed and then tabled for the next meeting. Some members believe the give-away should be only to 501c3s while others believe it should include struggling grassroots organizations. This discussion was tabled until next month.

If these or other pressing UUYO issues capture your interest, please see me or any other Board member, and feel free to join us for our next Board meeting on 7/11/2019 at 6pm.
